The Great Snatch (the Rapture)

John 14:1-3 and 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

John 14:1-3 NLT "¹ Don't let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God, and trust also in me. ² There is more than enough room in my Father's home. If this were not so, would I have told you that I am going to prepare a place for you? ³ When everything is ready, I will come and get you, so that you will always be with me where I am."

Observation: Circle each time the word "trust" is mentioned. Box the phrase - "come and get you." Underline "always be with me."

- 2. How did Jesus <u>not</u> want His disciples to respond to His departure? How did He want them to respond? (14:1)

1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 NLT "¹³ And now, dear brothers and sisters, we want you to know what will happen to the believers who have died so you will not grieve like people who have no hope. ¹⁴ For since we believe that Jesus died and was raised to life again, we also believe that when Jesus returns, God will bring back with him the believers who have died.

15 We tell you this directly from the Lord: We who are still living when the Lord returns will not meet him ahead of those who have died. 16 For the Lord himself will come down from heaven with a commanding shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trumpet call of God. First, the believers who have died will rise from their graves. 17 Then, together with them, we who are still alive and remain on the earth will be caught up in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. Then we will be with the Lord forever. 18 So encourage each other with these words."

Observation: Underline each mention of "died" and "alive" or its equivalent. Circle the phrase - "caught up." Box any reference to a location.

We should live in this evil world with wisdom, righteousness, and devotion to God, 13 while we look forward with hope to that wonderful day when the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ, will be revealed."

- 10. What anticipation should every Christian have? (2:13)
- 11. How should we live if we are anticipating the return of Christ? (2:12-13)
- 12. What can you do to make sure you are ready for Christ's return each day?

Conclusion

The rapture of the Church is the believer's blessed hope (Titus 2:13). Anticipating the return of Christ and the rapture of the Church has a motivating and purifying effect upon the follower of Christ.
